YEAR 9

- Regarding uniform, there have been a number of students wearing blue tracksuit pants that are not the official Kambrya ones. Course Counseling and Form Submission for 2008

Any Year 11 student who has yet to be course counselled for 2008 must return their course selection paperwork (BLUE FORM) to Ms McKenzie or Ms Williams to ensure a place in year 12 in 2008.

Year 10 students who still need to submit forms should return them to Ms Appleby or Mr Perry as soon as possible to ensure an appropriate course for 2008.

Year 10 Work Experience

Work Experience is an integral part of the Year 10 programme and is specifically linked to the subject "It's My Life". Students are expected to have their work experience placement organised for the end of this term and the forms for this should be returned to the school. If you have not yet finalised your work experience, please make it a priority and do not hesitate to contact your class teacher, Year Level Leaders or the Careers Staff for assistance.

This term we will be continuing to hold after school detentions on Tuesday and Thursday every week.

1. WHAT IS HAPPENING AT DEAKIN UNIVERSITY?

- Bachelor of Medicine – This graduate entry program commences 2008 using a systems approach and problem based learning. The first two years of the Bach. Medicine/ Bach. Surgery will be offered on the Geelong campus (Waurin Ponds) and the Geelong region, followed by two years in clinical schools within the Geelong, Ballarat and Warrnambool areas. A key focus is to help redress the acute doctor shortages in rural and regional areas. Initially, there will 120 Commonwealth Supported Places. **Selection:** results in the Graduate Australian Medical School Admission Test (GAMSAT), Grade Point Average (GPA) in the applicant's undergraduate degree, and an interview. There will be no pre-requisites, but part of the GAMSAT assumes science knowledge.
- Creative Arts and Digital Media – The Bach. of Contemporary Arts is now the **Bach. of Creative Arts** with majors in Dance, Drama and Visual Arts. There is now a separate degree for students wanting to specialise in Film and Animation – the B. Film and Digital Media. Some units in these courses encompass use of the **Deakin Motion.Lab**, Australia's most sophisticated motion capture facility. Motion capture technology enables animators to create realistic movement of characters in a fraction of the time and with greater accuracy than conventional animation techniques. Deakin's facilities for all these areas of study are fantastic! Check them at **Open Day on Sun 5 August** at the Melbourne (Burwood) Campus.

Kambrya College Student Uniform – Policy

Rationale:

- A uniform dress code reinforces in students a pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of the school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety, and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the Dress Code.

Aims:

- To promote equality amongst all students.
- To further develop a sense of pride in, and identification with our school.
- To provide durable clothing that is cost effective and practical for our school environment.
- To maintain and enhance the positive image of the school in the community.

Implementation:

- After consultation with the school community, College Council will develop a Dress Code that we believe provides choice for the students, allows for students to safely engage in the many varied school activities, and caters for the financial constraints of families.
- The Dress Code applies during school hours, while travelling to and from school, and when students are on school excursions.
- Summer and Winter uniforms, as well as a sports uniform will be prescribed, and are required to be worn.
- Stud earrings and sleepers; worn one in each ear lobe; plus watches are the only acceptable jewellery.
- **Extreme hair colors and/or extreme hairstyles (at the discretion of the Principal or their representative) are not permitted.**
- Other than clear nail polish, cosmetics may not be worn at school.
- As a sunsmart school we encourage all students to wear the college approved head cover.
- The student Dress Code, including details of uniform items and places of purchase, will be published in the newsletter at the start of each year.
- School Council requires the Principal be responsible for implementation of the Dress Code in a manner consistent with the Student Code of Conduct.
- Parents seeking exemptions to the Dress Code due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition or economic hardship must apply in writing to the Principal.

Evaluation:

- This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's three year review cycle.

Kambrya College Student Uniform – Requirements

The uniform is supplied by Graham Booth Menswear who carries a list detailing all aspects of the uniform requirements. The College Council asks that you support the College uniform policy from the time your child leaves home to their return.

The uniform is not designed to stifle creativity; rather it designed to develop a sense of belonging. We expect our students will wear the uniform with pride, and that it will be neat and tidy at all times. In particular the following points should be noted:

- Body piercing is not permitted and only one plain stud or sleeper per ear lobe.
- Nails are to be kept short and clean, without acrylic extensions
- Coloured nail polish and make up are not acceptable
- Extreme hair colours and/or extreme hairstyles (at the discretion of the Principal or their representative) are not permitted.
- Students are to be clean shaven.

The Kambrya backpack is the only bag recommended for students.

Terms 1 and 4 – Summer uniform

Blue bucket hats must be worn outside during recess/lunch and PE/sport classes.

GIRLS:

- Summer dress or;
- Check skirt and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or;
- Taupe shorts and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or;
- Taupe pants and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck);
- White or blue plain socks (must be visible above the ankle);
- Black leather shoes

BOYS:

- Taupe shorts and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or
- Taupe pants and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck)
- Plain black belt
- White or blue plain socks (no logos, must be visible above the ankle)
- Black leather shoes

Terms 2 and 3 – Winter Uniform

Navy Kambrya scarves are able to be worn

GIRLS:

- Checked winter skirt and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved or
- Taupe pants and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved
- College tie
- College jumper with embroidered College logo
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- Long white or blue socks or navy tights
- Black lace up leather shoes

BOYS:

- Taupe pants and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved
- College jumper with embroidered College logo
- College tie
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- White or blue plain socks (no logos)
- Black lace up leather shoes

Health and Physical Education/Sport Uniform

Students who have HPE or sport throughout the day (not including interschool sports training) are able to wear their full Sports uniform for the whole day.

GIRLS/BOYS:

- Navy blue Kambrya polo sport top with house colour on collar edge
- Kambrya navy sports shorts or
- Kambrya navy netball skirt or
- Kambrya navy tracksuit pants with terracotta piping
- Kambrya navy tracksuit jumper
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- White or blue plain socks (should be visible above ankle)
- Sturdy lace up runners

Seniors Uniform

Additions to the current uniform have been introduced for Year 11 and 12 Students only. These additions have been introduced to compliment the current uniform and to distinguish the Senior Students.

GIRLS/BOYS:

- Senior Navy Blue Zip Front Jacket
- College Senior tie (compulsory terms 2 and 3)
- Senior Polo Shirt (terms 1 and 4 only)

Technology/Science Requirements

For safety reasons, students are required to wear flat heeled fully enclosed black shoes.
