## PROTOCOLS FOR EARLY LEAVERS

- There is an important information evening for parents and students next week regarding subject choices for next year. Students will also participate in subject information sessions during Wednesday and Thursday next week. An outline of the program is included below.
- Regarding uniform, there have been a number of students wearing jackets and tracksuit pants that are not the official Kambrya uniform. ## **CareerNewsNo11; 20.07.07**

1. OPEN DAYS APPROACHING – University and TAFE Open Days are coming up soon. Make sure you attend the Open Days of **institutions you are thinking of applying for** when you leave school. You need to find out which institution **best suits you**, and visiting is a good start. Year 10 is not too soon to start visits. It is particularly important to attend Open Days if you are applying for courses which involve an **interview, folio presentation or audition**. It can be difficult to demonstrate a strong interest in a course that you have not fully investigated. (Note: Most Open Days are held between 10am-4.00pm).

2. HOW DO I GET THE MOST OUT OF OPEN DAYS? - DON'T wander around without any plans. Here are some suggestions:

- **Universities have Open Day Programs which are available in the careers room, on the web (eg at [www.swinburne.edu.au/studentrecruitment](http://www.swinburne.edu.au/studentrecruitment), [www.latrobe.edu.au/openday](http://www.latrobe.edu.au/openday), [www.deakin.edu.au/openday](http://www.deakin.edu.au/openday)) or at the institution on the day. Try to get a copy before-hand so you can plan your visit**
- Check the program before attending to find out what time lectures, displays, etc are on so that you are at the university/TAFE at the appropriate times
- Arrive early, and allow yourself several hours at each campus you visit
- Before you go, write down questions you want answered and find staff to answer them (eg What 'majors' can you study? Are there limits on numbers in any subject?)
- Ask questions about career prospects of graduates. What are graduates doing?
- Collect brochures about courses which interest you
- Talk to current students about their course to get their perspectives
- If you are concerned about obtaining the ENTER for the course you want, ask staff about the possibility of transfer after 1st year. What do they recommend?
- Look at the facilities available and make comparisons with other universities offering the same/similar courses. Where would you prefer to be?
- Find out about clubs and societies available
- Consider transport/parking issues. Perhaps you could travel the way you envisage travelling if you enrol there. Do you want this for the next three or four years?
- Look at accommodation available on campus if you plan to live away from home. Find out when you need to book in, and how much it will cost.

# Kambrya College Student Uniform – Policy

## Rationale:

- A uniform dress code reinforces in students a pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of the school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety, and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the Dress Code.

## Aims:

- To promote equality amongst all students.
- To further develop a sense of pride in, and identification with our school.
- To provide durable clothing that is cost effective and practical for our school environment.
- To maintain and enhance the positive image of the school in the community.

## Implementation:

- After consultation with the school community, College Council will develop a Dress Code that we believe provides choice for the students, allows for students to safely engage in the many varied school activities, and caters for the financial constraints of families.
- The Dress Code applies during school hours, while travelling to and from school, and when students are on school excursions.

- Summer and Winter uniforms, as well as a sports uniform will be prescribed, and are required to be worn.
- Stud earrings and sleepers; worn one in each ear lobe; plus watches are the only acceptable jewellery.
- **Extreme hair colors and/or extreme hairstyles (at the discretion of the Principal or their representative) are not permitted.**
- Other than clear nail polish, cosmetics may not be worn at school.
- As a sunsmart school we encourage all students to wear the college approved head cover.
- The student Dress Code, including details of uniform items and places of purchase, will be published in the newsletter at the start of each year.
- School Council requires the Principal be responsible for implementation of the Dress Code in a manner consistent with the Student Code of Conduct.
- Parents seeking exemptions to the Dress Code due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition or economic hardship must apply in writing to the Principal.

**Evaluation:**

- This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's three year review cycle.

## **Kambrya College Student Uniform – Requirements**

***The uniform is supplied by Graham Booth Menswear who carries a list detailing all aspects of the uniform requirements. The College Council asks that you support the College uniform policy from the time your child leaves home to their return.***

The uniform is not designed to stifle creativity; rather it designed to develop a sense of belonging. We expect our students will wear the uniform with pride, and that it will be neat and tidy at all times. In particular the following points should be noted:

- Body piercing is not permitted and only one plain stud or sleeper per ear lobe.
- Nails are to be kept short and clean, without acrylic extensions
- Coloured nail polish and make up are not acceptable
- Extreme hair colours and/or extreme hairstyles (at the discretion of the Principal or their representative) are not permitted.
- Students are to be clean shaven.

The Kambrya backpack is the only bag recommended for students.

### **Terms 1 and 4 – Summer uniform**

***Blue bucket hats must be worn outside during recess/lunch and PE/sport classes.***

**GIRLS:**

- Summer dress or;
- Check skirt and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or;
- Taupe shorts and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or;
- Taupe pants and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck);
- White or blue plain socks (must be visible above the ankle);
- Black leather shoes

**BOYS:**

- Taupe shorts and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or
- Taupe pants and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck)
- Plain black belt
- White or blue plain socks (no logos, must be visible above the ankle)
- Black leather shoes

## **Terms 2 and 3 – Winter Uniform**

*Navy Kambrya scarves are able to be worn*

**GIRLS:**

- Checked winter skirt and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved or
- Taupe pants and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved
- College tie
- College jumper with embroidered College logo
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- Long white or blue socks or navy tights
- Black lace up leather shoes

**BOYS:**

- Taupe pants and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved
- College jumper with embroidered College logo
- College tie
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- White or blue plain socks (no logos)
- Black lace up leather shoes

## **Health and Physical Education/Sport Uniform**

*Students who have HPE or sport throughout the day (not including interschool sports training) are able to wear their full Sports uniform for the whole day.*

**GIRLS/BOYS:**

- Navy blue Kambrya polo sport top with house colour on collar edge
- Kambrya navy sports shorts or
- Kambrya navy netball skirt or
- Kambrya navy tracksuit pants with terracotta piping
- Kambrya navy tracksuit jumper
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- White or blue plain socks (should be visible above ankle)
- Sturdy lace up runners

# Seniors Uniform

*Additions to the current uniform have been introduced for Year 11 and 12 Students only. These additions have been introduced to compliment the current uniform and to distinguish the Senior Students.*

## GIRLS/BOYS:

- Senior Navy Blue Zip Front Jacket
- College Senior tie (compulsory terms 2 and 3)
- Senior Polo Shirt (terms 1 and 4 only)

## Technology/Science Requirements
