YEAR 7

As the term draws to a close, students are reminded of their accountability in respect of the college uniform and punctuality to class.

The government mandate that schools provide 1,500 minutes of learning time a week to students, this averages out at 300 minutes (or five hours) a day. Learning time is when students are actively engaged in learning activities and tasks that assist them in developing a range of skills and competencies across a broad spectrum of learning areas. At Kambrya College the daily learning time is shared between the morning home room session and six periods (or three double periods).

The 10 minute home room session at the commencement of the day is considered as part of the students' learning time. It is integral to the organisation of the day, providing an opportunity for teachers to share information pertaining to:

- Accountability (roll marking, absences, permission notes etc);
- whole school activities;
- Year level activities;
- Room changes;
- Special events;
- Daily sporting events;
- Lunch time clubs and activities;
- Class specific activities
- Pastoral care;
- Discussion of current affairs;
- Thinking skills and
- Sharing and celebration of personal achievements.

Additionally the homeroom session gives students insight into the importance of being organised, a life skill that is essential to success.

Students arriving late to the home room session not only detract from their own learning time, but also that of their peers. It is important for students to understand that the school day commences at 9:00am with home room. This means that students need to arrive at school prior to this time to ensure that they get their books from the locker bay and get to their homeroom on time.

Consider the following scenario:

A student arrives 10 minutes late to home room, 5 minutes late to class after recess, and again after lunch on a daily basis.

The implication of this is:

The student misses 20 minutes of learning time a day

The student misses 100 minutes of learning time a week

The student misses 4,100 minutes of learning time a year over 41 school weeks

This equates to 13.6 school days a year of lost learning time.

This equates to nearly 3 full weeks of learning time missed a year.

Realistically this amount of lost time is doubled, at a minimum, for such a student. Why? Because when a student arrives late to class they miss the initial instruction that occurs at the beginning of the class, requiring either further instruction from the teacher or disruption to others in the class to determine the structure of the lesson.

The year 8 team encourage all year 8 students to investigate the plethora of lunch time activities being organised at school and to get involved. Furthermore, all students are encouraged to attend home work club to get

some extra assistance if they are struggling academically. This takes place after school every Wednesday.

YEAR 9

- Uniform has been a major issue at the school recently. Students out of uniform are receiving lunchtime detentions and parents are asked to support this policy. A reminder for students and parents that uniform is compulsory, including blue Kambrya pants with the orange stripe down the leg side. Also different coloured shirts under white shirts are not allowed. Short sleeve shirts are not acceptable and ties are compulsory. Any uniform infringements require a note from parents.
- Students should have returned their course selection forms for Year 10 by now. If any student has not done so it is essential they talk to their homegroup teacher urgently.
- Invoices have been sent recently for Journey fees. In order for the continued success of this program at Year 9 it is essential that these should be paid as soon as possible, or students may lose some Journey privileges. Also any outstanding fees from previous terms should be paid.
- Mid-term Roundtables did not occur in Year 9 this term. Journey teachers will be available to speak to parents at the regular Round Table interviews at the end of term.
- A reminder that IPods are not allowed to be used at school and will be confiscated. With the possibility of loss or stealing of these expensive items it is suggested students do not bring them to school.
- A visual diary was put on the booklist this year and students will be starting to use these in the next few weeks. These will be used across subjects, particularly in the Journeys, to document students' journey through year 9.
- A reminder to parents to (1) continue to sign planners every week and use them as a communication tool with teachers; (2) Provide a note explaining any absences when the student returns.

Kambrya College Student Uniform – Policy

Rationale:

- A uniform dress code reinforces in students a pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of the school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety, and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the Dress Code.

Aims:

- To promote equality amongst all students.
- To further develop a sense of pride in, and identification with our school.
- To provide durable clothing that is cost effective and practical for our school environment.
- To maintain and enhance the positive image of the school in the community.

Implementation:

- After consultation with the school community, College Council will develop a Dress Code that we believe provides choice for the students, allows for students to safely engage in the many varied school activities, and caters for the financial constraints of families.
- The Dress Code applies during school hours, while travelling to and from school, and when students are on school excursions.
- Summer and Winter uniforms, as well as a sports uniform will be prescribed, and are required to be worn.
- Stud earrings and sleepers; worn one in each ear lobe; plus watches are the only acceptable jewellery.
- **Extreme hair colors and/or extreme hairstyles (at the discretion of the Principal or their representative) are not permitted.**
- Other than clear nail polish, cosmetics may not be worn at school.
- As a sunsmart school we encourage all students to wear the college approved head cover.
- The student Dress Code, including details of uniform items and places of purchase, will be published in the newsletter at the start of each year.
- School Council requires the Principal be responsible for implementation of the Dress Code in a manner consistent with the Student Code of Conduct.
- Parents seeking exemptions to the Dress Code due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition or economic hardship must apply in writing to the Principal.

Evaluation:

- This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's three year review cycle.

Kambrya College Student Uniform – Requirements

The uniform is supplied by Graham Booth Menswear who carries a list detailing all aspects of the uniform requirements. The College Council asks

that you support the College uniform policy from the time your child leaves home to their return.

The uniform is not designed to stifle creativity; rather it designed to develop a sense of belonging. We expect our students will wear the uniform with pride, and that it will be neat and tidy at all times. In particular the following points should be noted:

- Body piercing is not permitted and only one plain stud or sleeper per ear lobe.
- Nails are to be kept short and clean, without acrylic extensions
- Coloured nail polish and make up are not acceptable
- Extreme hair colours and/or extreme hairstyles (at the discretion of the Principal or their representative) are not permitted.
- Students are to be clean shaven.

The Kambrya backpack is the only bag recommended for students.

Terms 1 and 4 – Summer uniform

Blue bucket hats must be worn outside during recess/lunch and PE/sport classes.

GIRLS:

- Summer dress or;
- Check skirt and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or;
- Taupe shorts and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or;
- Taupe pants and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck);
- White or blue plain socks (must be visible above the ankle);
- Black leather shoes

BOYS:

- Taupe shorts and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck) or
- Taupe pants and Midford white school short sleeved shirt (open neck)
- Plain black belt
- White or blue plain socks (no logos, must be visible above the ankle)
- Black leather shoes

Terms 2 and 3 – Winter Uniform

Navy Kambrya scarves are able to be worn

GIRLS:

- Checked winter skirt and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved or
- Taupe pants and Midford white classic shirt long sleeved
- College tie
- College jumper with embroidered College logo
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo

Health and Physical Education/Sport Uniform

Students who have HPE or sport throughout the day (not including interschool sports training) are able to wear their full Sports uniform for the whole day.

- Kambrya navy sports shorts or
- Kambrya navy netball skirt or
- Kambrya navy tracksuit pants with terracotta piping
- Kambrya navy tracksuit jumper
- College water proof jacket with embroidered College logo
- White or blue plain socks (should be visible above ankle)
- Sturdy lace up runners

Seniors Uniform
